To put things in perspective, Physical Therapy gives you *strength* to get out of bed, Occupational Therapy will teach you *how* to get out of bed, and Recreation Therapy will give you a *reason* to get out of bed.

The Therapeutic Recreation profession recognizes that recreation and leisure are integral components to achieving a high quality of life, it is through engagement in meaningful recreation and leisure that we understand who we are.



Tl'azt'en Community member, Anne Michell and Nak'azdli Community member, Dallas Sam, run the Tsilbalyan T'o program with a great deal of passion and energy. There are many excellent toys and books for children and their caregivers to interact with, crafts that engage and educate and lots of opportunities for everyone to learn Dakelh culture and language. Each day a nutritious meal is served.

Mental Health Clinician, Ruth Suvee, was on hand to lead a group discussion following the movie. Anne and Dallas prepared a meal that was shared by everyone who attended.



Clothing Giveaway at Eugene Joseph Elementary

Each Spring and Fall the Staff at Nezul Be Hunuyeh organize a clothing drive to gather new and gently used children's clothing to distribute to students at Eugene Joseph School. The students come through and go shopping. Each child is given a grocery bag and with the help of NBH staff, find what they want or need for clothes. Bags containing fun hygiene items, socks and underwear, are distributed to each student. Community members are welcome to attend.



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Children's Fairs - Nak'azdli and Tl'azt'en Communities

For the past three years, in early March, a children's fair has been held in the Eugene Joseph Gym. It is an event for Children 0-5 years and their Caregivers. Service providers who work in Tache are invited to come and provide information about their programs. Each Service Provider is asked to have an activity that will engage and entertain a young child. Invitations are delivered to each household with preschool children who live in Tache and Binche. Each child receives a literacy box including educational items, a t-shirt and additional items from service providers. Rides are available and lunch is served. This year we had 23 children and 20 adults in attendance along with 32 Service Providers.

Special highlights this year included a bouncy house, a clown and Dakelh children's author, Cecilia John, from Saik'uz.

Nezul Be Hunuyeh staff also participated in the Nak'azdli Blue Monday/Children's Fair on January 28th. We had a table full of prizes and crafts for those who attended.

Next year, in addition to the Tl'azt'en Children's Fair, Nezul Be Hunuyeh will partner with Nak'azdli Health Centre to run a Children's Fair for Nak'azdli children 0-5 years.

Eugene Joseph Book Fair—March 19

Each year, Nezul Be Hunuyeh organizes a book fair at Eugene Joseph School to promote literacy and engage youth in reading. The Agency accepts donations of new and gently used books year round to prepare for the event.

The sorted books were distributed on March 19. Each student has the opportunity to look through the books and choose those that appeal to them to own and take home.

In addition, the Agency purchases basic school supplies such as pencils and fun erasers to distribute.

The students anticipate the day with excitement and enjoy the opportunity to add to their home libraries. It provides children who may not otherwise have access to books the opportunity to develop an interest in and love for reading.



Jordan's Principle

Named in memory of <u>Jordan River Anderson</u> from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba, Jordan's Principle ensures that all First Nations children can access the products, services and supports they need, when they need them.

<u>Jordan's principle</u> recognizes that First Nation Children may need government services that exceed the normative standard of care and will evaluate the individual needs of the child to ensure <u>substantive</u> equality, culturally appropriate services, and/or to safeguard the best interests of the child.

Examples of supports covered under Jordan's Principle



- mobility aids
- wheelchair ramps
- addiction services
- services from Elders
- ·mental health services
- specialized hearing aids
- ·traditional healing services
- ·services for children in care
- •services for children in c
- assessments and screenings
- transportation to appointments
- medical supplies and equipment
- long-term care for children with specialized needs
- therapeutic services for individuals or groups (speech therapy, physiotherapy, occupational therapy)



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- social worker
- ·land-based activities
- · personal support worker
- specialized summer camps
- respite care (individual or group)
- specialized programs based on cultural beliefs and practices



school supplies tutoring services

- teaching assistants
- specialized school transportation
- psycho-educational assessments

Who is covered

Services provided under Jordan's Principle are available to:

- Registered First Nations children* living on or off reserve;
- First Nations children entitled to be registered, under the Indian Act including
 - those who became entitled to register under the December 22, 2017 amended provisions of the Indian Act, under Bill S-3;
 - o Infants under 18 months; and
- Any Indigenous child, including Non-Status First Nation or Métis, who are ordinarily resident on reserve.

* For the purposes of Jordan's Principle, a "child" is defined as an individual who is under the Age of Majority within their province or territory. In BC the age of majority is 19. As such, eligibility for Jordan's Principle ceases when Age of Majority is attained (Date of the child's 19th birthday).

Who can send requests

A request for a child or children in the same family or with the same guardian can be submitted by:

- parents or guardians caring for a dependent First Nations child under the age of majority in the child's province/territory of residence
- · a First Nations child above 16 years of age
- · an authorized representative of the child, parent or guardian
 - written or verbal consent must be provided by the parent or guardian

A request for a group of children from multiple families or guardians can be submitted by:

- · a community or service provider, who can request services, such as:
 - respite care
 - wheelchair ramps
 - support programs
 - educational assistants
 - transportation to school
 - local therapeutic specialists, etc.

How to send a request

Contact us through our call centre, open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, or your BC representative (see list below) to start your request for funding under Jordan's Principle. We are here to help.

Having certain information ready when you contact us can help if you are seeking access to funding for a product, service or support. This includes:

- · registration number for child or parent under the Indian Act (if available)
- the product, service or support needed and how often the product, service or support will be needed
- estimated costs
- copies of documents related to requests (e.g. prescriptions, referrals from health, social or education professionals)
- any additional information that should be considered to support the request.



The Neghunli-un Coordinator will assist in the development, training, implementation, and provide ongoing support to Elders Advisory Committees in each community served by Nezul Be Hunuyeh.

- Provide ongoing support to community through relationship building and community engagement

- Organize and implement community workshops and information sessions as identified


