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Culture Camp: July 21-25, 2019

Culture camp is an annual event hosted by Nezul Be Hunuyeh. Camp is held on the traditional shores of Nak'al Bun (Stuart Lake) on the Nak'azdli Whut'en Territory. Campers were welcomed by Duneza' and Ts'ekesa' (Hereditary Chiefs) from Nak'azdli & Tl'azt'en for the opening ceremony. Throughout the week of campchildren and their families were able to experience and gain traditional knowledge and life skills.

During the Potlatch we had a guest from the Thunderbird Clan and the Duneza and Ts'ekesa' (Hereditary Chiefs) had seated him with his children in the Lhts'umusyoo Clan (Beaver). Each year during the demonstration Potlatch Ceremony Nezul Be Hunuyeh does a "Welcome Home Ceremony" for children returning home or transitioning to the agency for the first time. This year for the Welcome Home Ceremony there were 9 children blanketed. The blanket has their clan symbol crest and each were gifted Culture kits that included:

- **A Drum**
- **Moccasins** •
- **Cultural Books** .

- **A Carrier Dictionary**
- A Clan Mug
- A Teddy Bear

The 2019 Culture Camp was one of the busiest camps so far! Thank you to everyone for making it a successful camp—we look forward to next year.

Shun Huznuta: Youth Mentorship Initiative

Shun Huznuta is the Youth Transition House. The name was chosen by community members & staff and the translation of Shun Huznuta means *"Looking for their song"*. This home has been created to help support youth from Nak'azdli & Tl'azt'en in their transition to adulthood. Staff have been hired who will be available to provide life skills, traditional and cultural support to those youth in the house. Nezul Be Hunuyeh Staff along with Richard Sampson who is the Clinical Counselor at Nak'azdli Health Centre, participated in Smudging the Youth Transition House with Cultural Worker, Jolene Prince. Staff smudged the gathering area, each bedroom, bathroom, and offices within the house. It is a way to cleanse and bring new light to the house. We are looking forward to new beginnings.
