Support Services: Apple Day

The mouth watering smells of apples and cinnamon drifted through the halls of Nak'al Bun October 9 and Eugene Joseph Elementary October 15 as students had the opportunity to learn how to make apple crisp that's to a joint project between Nezul Be Hunuyeh (NBH), St. Vincent de Paul and the Okanagan Fruit Growers. Each year a group of fruit growers donate the apples which are then transported to Prince George and distributed by the St. Vincent de Paul Society to over 30 agencies in Prince George and area including NBH. A pickup load of apples was bagged and distributed to school children along with baking demonstration by NBH staff, a recipe and all the ingredients needed to make the recipe at home. NBH Executive Director, Michelle Chase, a 33 year volunteer with the St. Vincent de Paul Society is grateful for the opportunity to be included in the project. "This is the sixth year the children and families we serve have benefited and it's a great opportunity to provide fresh fruit to the kids".



Support Services: Tsibalyan T'o

Tsibalyan T'o provides a place for caregivers and their preschool children to learn together and suppo9rt each other in a culturally enriched learning environment. The drop in program, coordinated by Anne Michell and Assistant Leona Nooski has become a gathering place for families. A total of 1350 people accesses the program between October 2018 and July 2019. The program runs four days per week including a family night every Tuesday evening.

Support Services: Fall/Winter Clothing Drive

Nezul Be Hunuyeh hosted the annual Fall/Winter Clothing Drive at Eugene Joseph Elementary on November 5. NBH accepts donations of new and gently used clothing throughout the year. Staff sort and distribute to children and families twice per year, in the spring and fall, at Eugene Joseph school. Teachers accompany their students one class at a time to "shop" for their seasonal clothing while NBH staff are on hand to help the students. Each child also receives a hygiene bag containing hygiene items along with new socks and underwear. The children look forward to these events as a former administrator states "When the kids hear NBH is coming, they know it's going to be a good day".

Community Advocate: Nak'azdli & Tl'azt'en

Nezul Be Hunuyeh has contracted with Nak'azdli Whut'en and Tl'azt'en Nation to hire a community advocate worker in each of their communities to provide support and information to families who are involved in the child welfare system. **A community advocate provides the following services:**

- Advocacy for families who are involved in the child welfare system
- Attends with MCFD when they receive a child protection report
- Attends with MCFD workers when they interview children
- Attends family court proceedings with families in Fort St. James
- Ensures families understand their rights in relation to child welfare law
- Assists families in securing legal counsel
- Receives court documents for families who are residing outside traditional lands
- Assists in developing safety plans for children to prevent removals from the community
- Attends family court in Fort St. James to provide support and information and to speak on behalf of the band
- Attends meetings with the family

For community members who reside in Prince George, Nezul Be Hunuyeh workers provide these services. NBH cannot make decisions on behalf of a band in regards to the bands position. They can however, present the bands position if requested.

NBH also provides mentorship and training to community advocates.

Community Advocate: Training

Nezul Be Hunuyeh hosted training for Community Advocates, Elders, staff and Board of Directors October 23 and 24 in Fort St. James.

Presenter, Lise Haddock led participants through the *Child, Family, and Community Services Act* and provided an introduction to Bill C92 *An Act respecting First Nations, Inuit and Metis children, youth and families.*

Lise Haddock is an indigenous woman from Manitoba of Cree Metis descent. She brings many years experience as the Executive Director



at Lalum'utul' Smun'eem Child & Family Services and as the Director of Aboriginal Initiatives for the Office of the Representative for Children and Youth. Lise will be back in February as a keynote speaker at our Sharing Medicine Event.

Power Outage Protocol

Power outages are a common occurrence in Fort St. James. In most cases, power outages are very short in nature, but some last longer than 2-4 hours.

When the outages are going to be longer than 3 hours (especially in freezing weather), the following Protocol will be put in place.

- Kwah Hall will be opened and used as a Warming Center.
- Any event that is taking place in Kwah hall will be canceled.
- · If there is a Potlatch or Funeral, Kwah Hall will open after to the public
- · All Nak'azdli members and surrounding community are welcomed.
- The kitchen will be used to heat or cook food.
- There will be refreshments provided.
